

A Message from the Founding President

I can't really talk about the founding of the WCHS without first recalling how the Vancouver Homeopathic Academy got started. Before the VHA was created, there was a study group for homeopathy in Vancouver that I was fortunate enough to attend. Murray Feldman, newly returned from England, came to the study group to speak about homeopathy. We were all very keen, and hungry for more, so when Murray showed interest in putting on a course for beginners, we all voiced our support. In the fall of 1994, with Kim Boutilier as administrator and myself helping with the accounting, Murray began Year 1 of what would become the VHA.

The group of people who signed up for Murray's first year quickly discovered that there was no "structure" in BC for homeopathy. Wading into the unknown tends to make most people nervous, and so discussion soon began among the students and staff about what to do to fill the void.
